For our newer residents and others who may have not caught up yet, we have an arrangement with our NEW mowing contractors from TNA Lawn Services to mow the lawns of those residents who are not covered for this service in their contracts.

Payments can be organized by cash or through the slightly more expensive online invoice system...easy to manage without having to worry about being home or leaving cash out. ... Fletcher and Tom can also take care of most of your gardening needs from paving to mulching, clipping hedges, doing garden edging etc, as well as mowing ... in fact most things that we need to keep our gardens looking top rate. Don't hesitate to ring – Fletcher is very easy to do business with and will hopefully become one of our 'trusted tradies' as well.

Residents are requested to please **NOT** feed the native birds....

unless you are doing so in a manner which is also NOT FEEDING & ENCOURAGING THE PIGEONS. Your village committees recently spent a large amount of money to have feral pigeons removed/discouraged from nesting here, but some residents who continue to put out feed for the birds, have caused an increase in pigeons returning for a free feed. We really cannot afford to be paying out again for pigeon removal. If you must feed ????? then to discourage pigeons, try using feeders designed for smaller birds and prevent seeds from accumulating on the ground. Suet cake feeders also attract a variety of birds but do not appeal to pigeons. Use a caged feeder that allows access by the smaller birds but not by the pigeons. Planting native shrubs and flowers that provide seeds, and fruit is the most effective way to attract native birds to your garden and supports the local ecosystem.

Reasons to Birdproof your solar panels ... Nesting pigeons and other pest birds can accelerate the wear and tear on your panels, damaging the wiring underneath the panels. Corrosive bird dropping damage the solar panels and spread diseases such as Cryptococcus, Staphylococcus, Histoplasmosis and Bird mites/lice Solar panel warranties do not cover scenarios where the above happens. This can leave you, and your neighbours responsible for repairs that could have been prevented.

Pigeons nesting under solar panels can create a fire hazard by accumulating dry organic nesting materials, that can ignite in hot weather.

Feral pigeons carry over 60 potentially lethal pathogens and can transmit 30 different diseases to humans and animals. They pose severe risks to lung health which can rapidly escalate leading to nervous system paralysis and even death. The presence of feral birds can reduce the efficiency of your solar installation by up to 88%. They can also cause severe damage to your roof and guttering, as well as to your neighbours. Your committee has organized for one of our trusted tradies, who cleans solar panels, to visit here in November. It is suggested that residents also look at bird proofing their solar panels.

The go ahead was finally given to the supplier of the new audio/visual equipment for which we recently obtained a grant. Delivery and installation is expected to take place in October, all going to plan. Residents should be delighted to have this facility available. A HUGE TV Screen, better sound system and public address system, along with other media refinements will give our residents a state of the art, top notch entertainment hub that will be greatly appreciated. The new equipment will enable us to access Netflix, Amazon and other streaming services. This is a huge expenditure with little change left over from \$13,000.00. We can look forward to some beaut movie nights, Melbourne Cup Days, Footy fever State of Origin, Live Tennis – whatever rows your boat. You'll need to supply your own popcorn though.

A big thank you to David Morgan, our RPRA Secretary for the hours of work he put in, getting quotes etc to get this organized, and to our President John for organizing and driving committee people to the retailers in our new Village bus, to nail down the best prices and see what it was that we actually getting. Hometown

kindly added some \$'s into the kitty for this project and forward planning for next year's budget, Hometown is getting quotes to replace the common area fencing and the lounge furniture in the Grand Hall and Library, and flyscreens were also mentioned I seem to recall.

- Hall will NOT be air-conditioned; quotes are being obtained for flyscreens.
- Replacement of hall furniture included in next year's budget.
- Solar installation is still under review.

- Audio-Visual Equipment: Quotes are being sought for additional equipment.
- Visitor Parking: No designated visitor parking at the lower end of the village; visitors occasionally use the wash bay or residents' driveways.
- Seniors Expo Update: 35 exhibitors invited, flyers distributed to local home parks, media outlets contacted; morning tea provided by Social Club for a gold coin donation.

Currently our gates are open Monday to Friday between 7am and 5pm. We are reviewing this with the intention of having them open 7 days a week from 7am to 6pm. This consistent schedule will make access easier for residents, visitors, health workers/carers and couriers while supporting our community. Whilst there are considerations re security and maintenance, the benefits of improved access and reduced maintenance and frustration, outweigh the drawbacks.

Some resident's phones are not working with the gate system (land lines) or they cannot get to their phone quickly enough to activate the 'open sesame' button, and the delivery person leaves. With the current system we are finding that some couriers who are unable to contact a resident or access the gates are throwing parcels over the gates or just leaving them outside the office – which leaves them vulnerable to theft and in the case of groceries subject to spoilage. On weekends, family and unexpected visitors are also inconvenienced with the gates being closed. We believe the extended opening hours will better meet resident's needs.

Just a reminder – yet again – that if residents are walking their dogs around the village and it Poops, then YOU SCOOP.... it's not rocket science people; it is called responsible pet ownership.

We don't mind sharing, but if you really don't want to share the hall, library and kitchen with Blue Tongue Lizards, Snakes, Birds and even (God Forbid) an Ibis that crapped all over our lovely piano – then **PLEASE SHUT THE BLOODY DOORS** when in the hall and when you leave. Flyscreen doors are in the pipeline.



One of our residents has raised the question re poor reception down the bottom of the Village, saying that sometimes it is impossible to dial out and they then have to rely on Text messages. This is a safety concern, and climbing a tree to get a better signal is apparently not an option. Does anyone know how to overcome the problem? (That's the phone issue – not the tree climbing one) If so please come along to the next residents committee meeting and share your knowledge, or let a committee member know.

LIBRARY NOTES ... Unfortunately, this didn't make the last newsletter as it was received after the cut off time, but our Volunteer librarians, Laurie and Lee would like to thank all those involved in the packing and unpacking of the library during the recent repaint at the hall. Many of those who helped were unknown to them – but a big THANK YOU too all.

Seniors can save up to \$3,000 a year...but only if they have THIS card

The Commonwealth Seniors Health Card (CSHC) had long been a valuable but underused benefit. Despite around 1.9 million self-funded retirees in Australia, only 22 per cent had successfully applied for it. Retirement Essentials estimated that the savings could reach \$2,000 to \$3,000 annually, yet many had missed out.



The eligibility criteria for the CSHC was reviewed and updated on 20 September 2025 in line with the Consumer Price Index. For singles, the income threshold rose to \$101,105 from \$99,025, while couples saw their threshold increase to \$161,768 from \$158,440.

Deeming rates also shifted. Singles had the first \$64,200 of financial assets deemed at 0.75 per cent, while couples had \$106,200 deemed at the same rate. Amounts above those levels were deemed at 2.75 per cent. From September 2025, the CSHC would be issued as a laminated card, though older versions would remain valid until replaced.

Many had missed out in the past due to common misconceptions, not realising that eligibility can change from year to year. If you're over 67, it's worth checking again with Centrelink, you might be surprised at how much you could save.

Car insurance premiums constantly rising? ... Have you considered a pay as you drive policy? Australian Seniors Insurance (and others) offer a policy where you agree to a maximum number of kilometres each year. Your premium is reduced to reflect the lower usage. You can apply to increase the limit at any time. Seniors often drive less frequently, and these policies are an ideal way to reduce your premiums.
